

Workplan for 2022

Due to the corona situation, there have not been the same opportunities as expected to work actively and strategically for many of the good elements of the 2021 work plan. The topics have not become less relevant, and we have therefore reused much of the content from last year's work plan.

Even though we are about to start a new year, the corona virus is still a part of our everyday life and will have an impact on most parts of our work. It's going to require flexibility, and together as an organization, we must be ready to think outside the box and find new ways of working.

Students' life situation during COVID-19 has, if anything, shown us that we need to stand together and fight. We must take an active role in fighting the increasing loneliness, and work with the rest of the student movement, so that the students are not forgotten in the important decisions made as a result of the pandemic.

Furthermore, it should be a goal to make this workplan as realistic as possible. To avoid adding to the stress level of our core volunteers, we will attempt to set realistic targets in this workplan and look at what we can do to kickstart SR again after the pandemic.

Political Priorities

RUC's part in the national educational landscape

As the Student Council of RUC, the foundation for our political work is to ensure that RUC is continuously developed through the values on which RUC is built. In a political landscape that tends towards increasing standardization, it is important that we as students stand our ground and fight for what makes RUC unique. This is applicable for our mentality as a university, the structure of our educational programs, and our pedagogical methods. Student initiated projects, combined educations, interdisciplinarity, and project work are all elements that make the education offered at RUC both progressive and diverse.

Currently, universities are facing a national development that leans strongly towards adjusting to the demands of the business world. Even though most progress-reforms have been removed, there is still a lot of incentive management integrated in the financing of

universities to force students through educations and into the jobmarket as quickly as possible. We should fight to remove all incentive-based financing to ensure universities freedom in structuring educations as they see fit locally. We are encouraged to choose educations with high job security, according to what the business world requests. At the same time, universities are continually faced with threats of cut- backs making it increasingly more difficult to plan and execute quality education programs. This is problematic not only for students, but also for the progress and development of our university and society as a whole. In recent years we've seen many examples of RUC's management leaning towards the same tendencies and discourse. This is problematic, as these attacks on our flexibility and diversity are beginning to come from both outside and within. This is why the Student Council must work to keep RUC as a progressive university where diversity and creativity is celebrated, and where the students are the main focus. The best way to do this is through the different influential bodies at RUC, and by participating in public debate about the university's role in society. Thus, the fight for our values and self-understanding at RUC must be taken both internally and externally.

Recently both unemployment benefits for graduates and the SU grant for master students have been under attack. Reducing or removing these benefits will strongly limit people's opportunity to take an education and find a job that is relevant to the education they've spent many years on. Everyone will lose on this – both students and all of society. We should fight against any reduction for students and recent graduates.

Local Priorities

We will continue our fight for inclusion of all students in the decision-making processes at RUC. We see a tendency that more and more decisions are made by the university leadership at the expense of the democratic boards and councils, such as the Academic Council, Institute Councils and Study boards. We have to keep fighting against this trend and insist that RUC will continue to be a university where the study boards make decisions relevant to the educational programs. This is why decision-making power should be brought back to the students and scientific personnel within the different subject areas of RUC.

In general, it is the opinion of the Student Council that all students should be heard in matters of their own education. Therefore, we will push for broader representation. This will be done partly through continuing work to ensure that all main subject areas are represented in the Academic Council, and partly through an enhanced focus on possibilities for involvement and cooperation with RUC - and a broader, more strategic use of these possibilities.

During the last years, we've seen several issues occur around the election. This should not derail the student democracy at RUC, and therefore we should look into different options that RUC could take to avoid election fraud and remove some of the bureaucracy connected to the election process and student democracy. Additionally, The Student Council should make RUC prioritize fixing the election system in order to ensure that international students have the same ability and access to voting as all other students.

Recent year's work with the master's reform has shown us that it is incredibly important to have a strong collaboration with the scientific personel (VIP) and the technicaladministrative personel (TAP). In the past years, we have seen several cases, both at RUC but also other universities, where university managements have made important decisions without actual involvement in processes, neither for students nor VIP and TAP. For the democracy of our university, we will work more strategically in the future to strengthen this cooperation through dialogue. For the same reasons, we will support VIP and TAP for better political organization.

National Priorities

We will take part in national discussions about student welfare and social affairs as well as discussions about academic affairs through our collaboration with Danske Studerendes Fællesråd (DSF) and other Student Councils. It should be a priority for the Student Council to encourage our fellow students to take part in the national political work done in DSF. This will be done by informing them about the different committees, activities, courses and events, etc. that are hosted by DSF.

In recent years, the focus on sexism as part of the Me-too debate has led to RUC also gaining a greater focus on the issue. That RUC has now increased focus on the sexism debate is positive, however only makes for a part of a broader anti-discrimination debate, that we will continue to fight for at RUC. As a student council, we must take the lead in showing that national discussions and agendas are also local and that these issues also concern students. That is why we must be active participants in the societal debate. The university has a responsibility as a knowledge-creating institution, and we must work to ensure that RUC remembers this.

During the last year, the freedom of research have been heavily discussed and some fields have been criticized for, among other things, being too activist. This is a worrying development, even for us as students, as our educations are based on research. We want to stand guard around the freedom of research and through that also around the autonomy of the study boards to decide what should be taught on the programmes.

Continuous Political Agendas

We must strive to live up to the mandate the students have given us at the university election. This doesn't end as a new year begins and therefore, it will be the priority of the Student Council to work on the political agendas from the previous year's concurrent with the work of the parols from the 2021 election as well as new political priorities that may occur within the coming year.

The previous years we have worked to improve justice for students in the form of a student ambassador, who would offer independent legal advising for students encountering unjust treatment by RUC. The student ambassador should also be able to give general comments on RUC's practices. This fight is not won, and we should continue to push for a fair and transparent legal system for all students at RUC. Even if we will get a student ambassador, we have to remember that it is still the role of the Student Council to be on watch for the students.

In recent years, there has been a noticeable push from students towards taking action on combating climate change. We have worked actively for the green agenda at RUC, and in

2020 we have had a climate mandate in the academic council. It has been an important step and now we must hold RUC responsible for the climate initiatives that have been initiated, while also continuing to seek out new initiatives and solutions. A currently discussed initiative is waste sorting. We will push for its quick implementation, and it must be easy and accessible for students, VIP, and TAP, alike

We will continue to focus on climate-related issues and initiatives, and work towards developing our stance on climate as action-oriented and ambitious. This includes continuing and improving upon our own internal practices, as well as actively fighting for RUC to take action on its own shortcomings.

We have, in past years, worked to prevent two of the most common issues with recent cutbacks. One of which being worsened conditions for our educations - especially in regard to project work. Too often have students had issues with supervisor hours, censor ratings, and the like. As RUC continues to cut down on core parts of our projects, it becomes increasingly difficult to maintain the high level of subject knowledge and academic competencies that we wish for our students. Therefore, we will continue the work to ensure a good frame for a good education at RUC.

At the same time, the quality of the study environment has been complicated by the many financial cuts and subsequent forfeiting of buildings, which has resulted in less space for more students and a larger distance between the students and the administration. The institutes are lacking a cohesive and thriving student environment, and many students find that they lose connection to their house after their first three semesters. This means that students no longer recognize the safe structure of their education after they finish the third semester. The Student Council will work towards making sure that all students of RUC have physical spaces where they feel secure, welcomed, and feel some degree of ownership. This could be started by ensuring that all students have access to all of our buildings at campus, and also that we as students are allowed to book the bigger rooms by default. We will push for proper classrooms as well as group rooms. This is a continuous

struggle that we will participate in through different bodies at RUC in cooperation with our fellow students.

As mentioned above it is important that all students are heard and represented at the decision-making bodies, and therefore the Student Council will continue to push for representation areas in the Academic Council.

This is especially important in matters where the conditions for some students at the university vary from others. This is still largely the case for international students. We have international students enrolling every year, bringing a lot of perspective, knowledge, and experiences. However, too many are disappointed when they learn of how few subjects are available for them to choose from. At the same time, too much of RUC is inaccessible to non-Danish speakers - from information at intra.ruc.dk to our political bodies. We believe that RUC should be serious about internationalization, not just for the sake of internationals, but for all of us as students. The result of university election in recent years clearly shows that international students want the same opportunities for participation in their university life, as danish students have. We must work to ensure that meetings in RUC's bodies are open to international participation on equal footing with other elected students, as long as this does not hinder the work of the university board.

Previous boards have started work with improving the well-being of students. In lieu of the pandemic and the declining well-being amongst students this agenda is increasingly more important for the students, and we will therefore continue this work with a renewed focus.

Structural involvement

To ensure proper processes in the bodies at RUC, we must work for structural involvement. All too often we experience not being listened to, even though we as students should be the most central when making decisions about our university and our educations. We are both the foundation and the purpose of RUC, and we should never need to fight for involvement in the decision-making processes.

Together with the rest of the student movement, we will work both locally and nationally towards giving the Academic Council real influence. Thereby, we will ensure that students

are heard and that our input has real significance and cannot be ignored by the university management.

A university with room for everyone

Over the past year, we have had a strong focus on student well-being, and we have worked both internally and externally with this matter. We must continue to work to create a university that prioritizes our well-being and that provides opportunities for a student life that is good for all students.

During the university elections 2021, we've brought a lot of attention to the problems regarding students' mental health. In order to create a university with room for everyone, we must work broadly with well-being, and in future also have an even greater focus on students with other prerequisites than the majority.

Organizational Priorities

The subject councils

The subject councils are the most important players in creating coherence in the local study environments, mobilizing activity around campus, and representing the students in the local Study Boards. We consider collaboration with the subject councils as one of the most legitimate ways to represent students in the four subject areas, and to understand the challenges they each experience locally. Therefore, it is a top priority to continue supporting the subject councils as active and well-functioning units both organizationally and financially. We aim towards a mutual cooperation where all organizations can benefit from each other.

Student Representatives Network

The Student Representatives Network (stud.rep.) have for several years been on the Student Council's workplan, but we still haven't made a stable and functioning stud.rep. It have proven to be a big task, which have been difficult to realise with everything else that is constantly going on. Currently the volunteer environment is at a fragile state on RUC after

the pandemic, and this will be prioritised higher than creating stud.rep. If we, despite current expectations, have the resources to do it, the Student Council still want to create a stud.rep as a student political network for student reorientates in UB, AR, IR and study boards. Here the student Council will aim to create a better and stronger cooperation with the student representatives. To ensure this, the elected members together with the executive committee, will be more involved in the work and the well-being of the student representatives. There are two main goals of this work: 1) to ensure coordination and collaboration between elected representatives of different bodies and 2) to ensure the upgrading of qualifications and professional discussion between the elected representatives to maximise their influence. Through a strong network we can push further for the inclusion of students in all decisions.

International focus

When speaking of internationalization and international focus in an organization, the most important part is to focus on making RUC a place where all students feel comfortable, safe, and fully included. We have made great strides in the past year in working towards making RUC a place where students always feel safe to share their perspective, no matter what their preferred language is. We will continue to ensure that everything is translated for all involved to understand.

Communication and Public Relations

It is important to inform our students about what we do as the Student Council. Therefore, we want to be more transparent in our work and initiatives. The Student Council will work towards a broader acquaintance with all RUC students. It is important for the Student Council to ensure that as many students as possible knows about the Student Council and the activities of the Student Council. Our communication on social media should be organized and clear in order to reach a broader range of students. The Student Council should be open about what topics are being discussed at board meetings and use the agendas to catch the students' interest in various topics, and thus foster a wider interest in the Student Council's work. We will work to help students get information about their studies as well as the academic and social environment.

Internal communication will be centered around digital platforms that increase transparency and makes tasks easy to approach. We will strive towards keeping internal communication on social media to a minimum. This could also be done by moving our internal communication to another media such as Slack. We will still be able to have urgent messages on social media, when something important has happened, that need to be taken care. Otherwise, there is no need to keep the communication on social media, since it sadly results in a working environment that exists during most of the day.

Volunteer ‘hygge’ and working environment

An organization with as many different tasks and workloads as the Student Council needs to have a continuous focus on maintaining a positive working environment. We want to prioritize creating a comfortable and relaxed social atmosphere that is both including and welcoming for all our volunteers. We wish for the Student Council to be able to accommodate all kinds of volunteer involvement and engagement. This is more important than ever due to COVID-19 creating a difficult work environment. It is therefore a priority to create an attractive environment for the volunteers. The working environment should be inclusive, welcoming, and should strive to meet the requests and wishes of the volunteers. Our volunteers are students first, which should always be accommodated in the organization.

In order to fulfill this, we will have to recruit and include a broad range of students, making sure that there are always enough hands to do the job. This will be achieved through a transparent workflow, making it easier for new volunteers to figure out where to put their focus. The hope is to recruit more new volunteers and at the same time take better care of the ones we have, ultimately leaving the Student Council with a bigger volunteer basis. We understand that this is not achieved within a single year and the work should therefore be done in a sustainable way, making sure that the effort can continue in the future.

Furthermore, the working and volunteer environment should also be prioritized within the Student Council. It has happened too often that especially our most active volunteers and

executive committee members been pressured too much by the high workload. We need to actively work for an environment that is not putting too much pressure on the mental health of our volunteers or the executive committee.

Cooperation with other organizations at RUC

The other student-driven organizations at RUC, both within and outside of the student house, do a significant job in improving the social environment at RUC. Therefore, they are natural collaborators in a lot of the work of the Student Council. We should prioritize constructive and fruitful social relations, as well as cooperation with these organizations when we have interests in common goals. The Student Council should work towards developing a strong collaboration with the Queer Culture Club, to ensure a norm critical, intersectional and inclusive student environment. Furthermore, we will continue to work for better conditions for student driven organizations on RUC.

Financial priorities

We want to develop a structure that ensures attention towards the legal obligations and responsibility that come with being an organization. We aim towards creating internal procedures that can support us in continuing to be a stable economic organization. This will aid us in getting as much value for money as possible together with care and reflection when utilizing our resources. At the same time, it is important that we live up to our full potential by staying ambitious with our activities and goals. It is essential that we use our financial resources in a way that benefit the students at RUC as widely as possible.

In addition, we want to continue to be inclusive and transparent in financial matters and decisions, as all financial decisions ultimately will be political decisions as well.

Throughout the year, the Board will make initiatives to maintain an overview and assure the quality of the financial reports.

Skill Development Effort

It will be a priority to provide skill development workshops and seminars for different types of volunteers in the Student Council. We believe that we need to prepare our internal

members and collaboration partners for the tasks they have taken upon themselves, so that all volunteers in the Student Council have a strong set of tools to fulfill the tasks given/taken. The Board and volunteers of The Student Council can throughout the year make proposals for skill development workshops and seminars.

Academic Priorities

Academic Network (Fagligt Netværk)

The FANE collaboration has the potential to offer a broad range of courses to all RUC students - free of charge. We believe that it is part of our job as a Student Council to work towards filling in potential knowledge gaps at the university, and we see this collaboration as a good and productive way of doing so. We will therefore continue to work for this - and to work to make it even more relevant for the students. If need be throughout the year, we will supplement the FANE courses with academic courses of our own in order to offer the right extracurricular courses for the students of RUC. It is important to note here that we will take more control of the collaboration with external partners, so we as a Student Council can use our available resources to execute events on our own. We aim to improve the branding and promotion of FANE and academic courses by making it more accessible and visible to students of RUC, both physically and digitally. The students should be able to voice their ideas and wishes for courses.

Social Priorities

Tutoring

Tutoring is the foundation of the study environment at RUC - both for new students and for tutors. This is in huge part thanks to the people involved. Though Tutoring should always be centered around the new students, it is important to remember that it starts with the volunteers. As being responsible for the study start, the Student Council will help to ensure that all people involved with tutoring get the proper education and assistance needed. This can be achieved in multiple ways, but the key method for this will be skill development for the rus-chairpersonship and tutors, and a strong Student Council presence in the events of tutoring this upcoming year. The Student Council will furthermore push RUC to do the

same, demanding skill development and educational opportunities for the Student Council, rus-chairpersonship, and tutors in regard to tutoring. The Student Council should furthermore continue to work towards making Tutoring more inclusive for everyone e.g. by actively working against discrimination, boundary crossing behaviour, and harassment of all sorts, through necessary education, conversation, and critical reflection. Hereby also ensuring better and safer working conditions for our volunteers.

Locally embedded social environment

One of the things we are proud of about RUC is the range of possibilities for students to actively engage in their local environment. The development of the social environment in local arenas is a substantial part of supporting the greater study environment and well-being amongst all students. Therefore, supporting a healthy study environment in the local arenas at RUC should continue to be a priority for the Student Council. We will continue to focus on the social and structural study environment - both in the houses, at the individual subjects, at the institutes, and across campus in general. The Student Council shall work to ensure that student driven initiatives and engagement can thrive within the social environment at RUC. The consequences of COVID-19 have made it clear how important a strong social environment is. Therefore, we in the Student Council will make it a top priority to further engage and socialize the students at RUC with the goal to maintain the social capabilities there have been created. Furthermore, with a fully open campus again, the Student Council will work towards bringing back the strong and consistent social environment at the university.

The Social Event Committee (SEC) - Social activities for all

While a local social environment is important for the university, broad and inclusive social activities are equally important. The Student Council should continue to organize social events for all RUC students in order to facilitate socializing between students from different institutes. This is also a good way for the Student Council to reach out to different groups of students than we normally meet through most of our other activities and should therefore continuously be prioritized. It is important to the Student Council that as many students as possible knows about the work and activities of SEC. This will ensure more attendants for

the created activities while strengthened the public relations of the organization. A priority of SEC is to host different larger events. While keeping this focus, SEC will also prioritize making a wide variety of smaller events, to further improve the social environment while branding the Student Council. Moreover, we want to utilize SEC to a greater extent with regards to taking good care of our volunteers in order to provide them with fun and exciting experiences. Therefore, SEC should also focus on internal events.

Roskilde Festival

The Student Council has cooperated with Roskilde Festival for about a decade now. The subsidy that the Student Council receives each year in return for managing the Caravan area is a key part of our budget.

It is essential for the Student Council to maintain liquidity in order to freely plan and host activities for the students. In 2020, we utilized a large part of the potential of the collaboration. Although the festival was cancelled as a result of the corona virus, we managed to raise a lot of volunteers. In the future, we will use the experience with the planning for the festival this year, so we continuously have a great effort to recruit volunteers. Furthermore, there will be an increased focus on the volunteer experience in an effort to keep some of the RUC students as general volunteers for the Student Council once the new semester begins. The Student Council needs to ensure proper handover between the different years, so the knowledge in the organisation does not disappear, especially since the Student Council have not been able to facilitate Roskilde Festival since 2019.
